## Christian Formation Resource of the Month

### Belmont Mennonite — Spiritual Direction Groups

Spiritual Direction groups are used for discernment, deepening individual relationships with God, and asking difficult spiritual questions. Given this specific purpose, they differ from traditional small groups. Groups include four people plus a facilitator. Facilitators are lay persons selected for their spiritual maturity and experience with spiritual direction, and are trained in leading Spiritual Direction groups. Groups may be based on gender, or could also be both women and men. Pastors take responsibility to place persons. Groups make a 2-year commitment and meet once a month.

What our experience has taught us: Groups of this type have been a positive experience for the congregation. Group members have felt paying attention to God in the space and time that their group is together helps them pay closer attention to God's presence at other times, too. Group members find it easier to make connections between scripture and their own lives as they become more deeply acquainted with it by engaging in *Lectio Divina* at the beginning of each session. Spiritual awareness overall within the congregation deepens as groups like this come together to listen to God and to care deeply for each other. One of the challenges has been the level of commitment needed for participating in this type of group. Some have difficulty making a 2-year commitment. While this takes quite a bit of "start up" energy, it has proved valuable.

### Administrative Team update

Conference leadership groups gathered this past weekend at Amigo Centre for an experiment in considering together how we joyfully follow Jesus and cultivate a missional imagination in every congregation. Missional Leadership Team (MLT) met Thursday evening and Friday to anticipate the coming year and imagine its work. Friday



evening and Saturday other leadership groups joined in: Advisory Council (AC), Leadership Enhancement Team (LET), Ministry Credentialing Team (MCT), Stewardship Team (ST), Gifts Development Team (GDT) and Conference Program Planning Committee (CPPC). As we gathered, conference moderator Jane Stoltzfus Buller and LET chair Suella Gerber led participants in considering ways congregations are joyfully following Jesus and ways our life together supports congregational life. We also took time to understand the work done and people touched by different groups. People affirmed the different ways conference works at leadership calling and development and congregational peer learning, and repeatedly identified communication as a primary challenge. Engagement and energy were good.

I am grateful for the gifted people who invest in the life of our conference and congregations.

Marcella Hershberger, interim conference administrator, led the search for a communications coordinator as Rachel Denlinger ended in mid-August. She has continued one day a week to help with the transition. Chris Rahe began September 8 as an interim. He comes with wide experience in the different aspects of communication, including a time at Mennonite Church USA offices. We hope to utilize his experience to update our communications strategy.

Thanks to many who have prayed for Brent Eash, regional pastor. He was admitted to the hospital in early August. We give thanks for the improvements he has experienced in the last month.

August was a month of contrasts. In many ways it was a slow month, but there was no lack of work. Vanessa worked hard at arrangements and registration for the leadership retreat. Congregations continue to send in leadership forms. Doug has worked with four new pastoral searches beginning soon and visited two northern Michigan congregations with pastoral leadership possibilities. Doug and I were both out of the office for several days for a wedding in Oregon.

The Journey board met and the Journey Weekend Learning Event is coming up September 12-14. Four new applicants needed to be assigned mentors. Three will start this fall and one will wait until winter to begin.

After spending several meetings on different credential reviews, the Ministry

Credentialing Team (MCT) gave most of its August meeting to other items that had been neglected, including several congregations seeking conference affiliation.

Dan preached at Hudson Lake Mennonite Church and engaged in conversation during the education hour. Doug preached at Valparaiso Mennonite Church and talked with their leadership. Both of us, plus the regional pastors, are available to preach in worship and engage during the Sunday School hour. We welcome requests to visit any conference congregation!

Jane and I met with the Unity and Variance Discernment Task Group for their first meeting on August 21. Members of the group are Mark Schloneger (chair), Will Fitzgerald, Joe Liechty, and Mandy Yoder. Unfortunately Jennifer Hayes stepped down because of some new challenges closer to home. The Missional Leadership Team (MLT) is looking for someone to fill that position. The task group is meeting regularly this fall. Information about the process will be sent out as it is available.

At the semi-annual gathering of mid-states conference leaders, we considered the idea of doing something together on church planting. No decision was made, but we noted some activities are being planned for convention in Kansas City. Dan shared the process being developed by the IN-MI Conference PLANT Network. We also discussed responses to the executive board decision about the Mountain States credentialing decision. We have encouraged pastors to participate in the Mennonite Church USA survey sent to all pastors. We acknowledged the increasing complexity conferences face in relating with congregations that are dually affiliated. The most recent is with Central District and Indiana-Michigan conferences doing credential reviews in a dually affiliated congregation. Because both conferences hold one credential on behalf of MC USA, it is not clear how different decisions would be acknowledged.

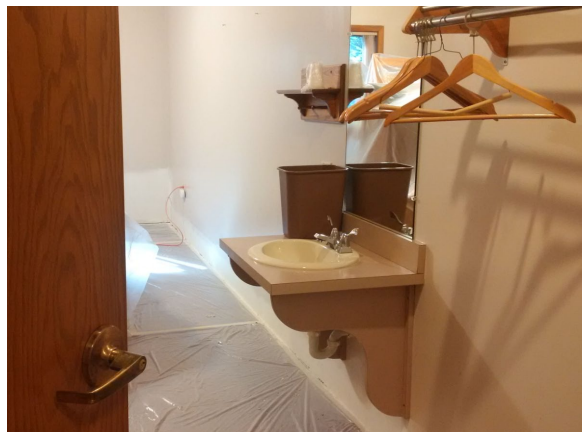

### **Amigo Centre water leak**

For those who are not aware, about a month ago Amigo Centre experienced a leak from a high volume pipe that resulted in several inches of water in the Retreat Center lower level. 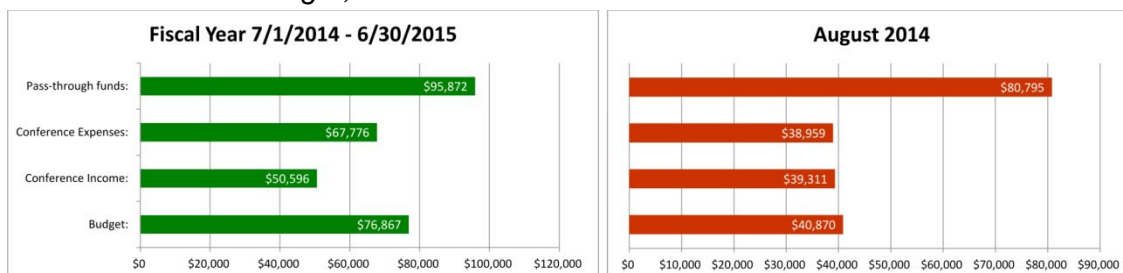
## Financial report

After July's exceedingly dismal beginning to the new fiscal year, August finances have been back in the ballpark of what was projected for the year's budget. In August, conference income was \$39,311, roughly \$1500 below what was budgeted for the month. However, expenses were also kept under budget at \$38,959, so that income exceeded expenses for the month by \$352. The \$17,180 worth of expense over income for the year is reflective of July's deficit. Because patterns from earlier years have not been holding, July's low income was a surprise, and August's much-improved picture is cause for gratitude!

Congregations also provided \$80,795 in earmarked donations to local, regional, and national ministries through conference during the month of August. That raises the total for this fiscal year to \$95,872.

Thank you for your support for conference. Please continue to support conference in whatever ways you can, through prayer, personnel (volunteer time), funding, and feedback.

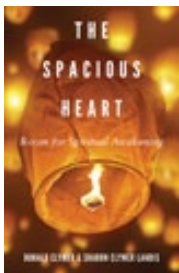
## IN- MI Mennonite Women's fall retreat

### ***The Spacious Heart: Room for Spiritual Awakening***

Why do people, including Christians, feel empty, estranged and cynical? Many of us have tired of the pat answers that the church and religion have provided about our questions about faith and meaning in life. We know there's more—and we stand on the cusp of spiritual awakening, longing to reshape our connection with God.

In the tradition of Ronald Rolheiser's *The Holy Longing*, Don Clymer and Sharon Clymer Landis (brother and sister, both spiritual directors and retreat leaders) take modern spirituality and turn it on its head to flesh out a Christian spirituality of emptying oneself. How can I know God more fully? What does it mean to be a true servant walking closely with God: brutally honest with oneself, and true to Christ? Through riveting stories and text grounded in scripture, the book speaks to the deep cynicism of soul and despair that grip so many in this age.

Anyone wanting to become more loving, in touch with feelings, friends and family will find hope and direction in this easy-to-read book on the spiritual journey. We are all hungry for a full-flavored life, yet we ignore our deepest soul and quiet our cravings with more of everything. How does one embrace a spiritually simple life—gracious, accepting and fulfilling?
