A. Free Prayer Apps for Your Apple or Android Device

Take Our Moments and Our Days: An Anabaptist Prayer Book
Initially a two-volume set only available in print, it's now free via the app on your device.

2. The Upper Room

Daily devotionals sponsored by the United Methodist Church. Also at www.upperroom.org.

3. Pray As You Go

A 10-13 minute daily podcast that combines music, scripture and questions for reflection. Also at www.pray-as-you-go.org. 6 other languages are available via links at pray-as-you-go.org/about/.

4. Sacred Space
