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## IMMC UPDATE

### Celebrating

- **Election Day Communion**, an event for IMMC congregations, on November 3 at 7pm. This is an opportunity to affirm that our hope is in Jesus, even as we participate with others in national elections. Planning for this event is initiated by the CAMFell congregations, (Fort Wayne and south). More details coming soon!  
\* the September 11-13 [Journey](#) Weekend Learning Event, with Dan Schrock providing input on spiritual practices. IMMC has three people participating in Journey: Merv Reist (Kern Road), Ellen Morey (Prairie Street), Ursula Hess (Waterford). [Journey](#) is a 3-year missional leadership development program.
- 25 people participated in the fall All-Teams Retreat, September 18-19. The MLT shared data and observations from the demographic survey begun earlier this year, and asked leadership teams to consider how the work of intercultural competence impacts their IMMC work. MLT also shared initial process plans for seeking a new conference pastor.

\* Preparations for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Conference Sunday are underway. This year, Conference Sunday will be February 14, 2021. IMMC staff are preparing a few materials for interested congregations to use including video recording of a sermon and a children’s moment.

\* Missional Leadership Team (MLT) is connecting with IMMC staff and leaders to gather information to assist in the search for a new conference pastor. Dan Miller announced his resignation last month. He will continue through June 2021. MLT expects a search committee will be ready to receive applications at the beginning of the new year.

\* Brenda Meyer, Naomi Yoder and Dan Miller are participating in a meeting of the Constituency Leaders Council (CLC) this Friday and Saturday. This gathering is taking place virtually. The CLC serves as a council of elders at the denominational level. It is made up of representatives from each of the 16 member conferences in Mennonite Church USA and meets twice a year.

\* Dan Miller and Sharon Yoder participate in regular meetings of conference ministers in Mennonite Church USA. These meetings provide conversation about issues relevant to conference ministry work, and a chance to hear updates from one another.

\* Dan Miller met with pastors and leaders from Michigan on September 10. He also meets with Indiana pastors in area council meetings.

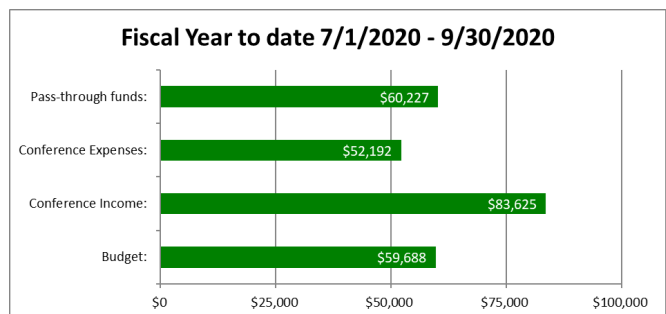
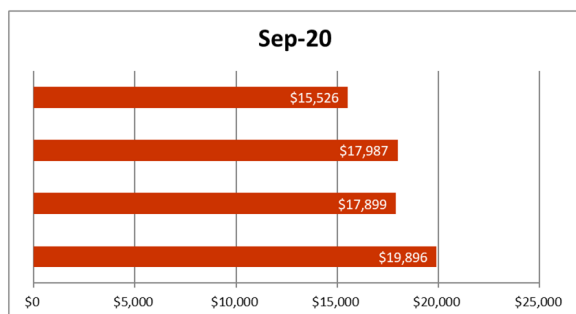
## Credentialing and Leadership Development

### **Local farm owned by Bethany alumni provides produce for cafeteria**

Clay Bottom Farm new source of garden greens for farm-to-table lunches.

Bethany's farm-to-table cafeteria just added another local contributor to the variety of produce integrated into school lunches here at BCS. Clay Bottom Farm, owned by alumni Rachel Hershberger ('95) and Ben Hartman ('97) recently began providing salad greens to the BCS cafeteria.

Tara Swartzendruber-Landis, Food Services Director at Bethany, talks about why this is important for the cafeteria this school year especially. "With COVID-19 affecting how we are serving our food this fall, and no regular salad bar, I still wanted to be able to have great salad greens for students and faculty/staff to have each week as a part of their meals."

Working with the local, Bethany alumni-owned farm seemed like a good option. "I talked with Clay Bottom during the summer break and they were just getting ready to plant their fall greens. Starting in September, they have been supplying us with salad greens each week," said Tara.

This is just one more example of the ways Tara has been developing and cultivating the local network of food providers as well as assisting with an on-campus garden that also provides produce for the cafeteria.

"It feels important to connect students to how our food is produced and the people behind what we eat. Using food from places like Clay Bottom and our school garden gives us a way to teach students about food choice and food justice," she said. "Plus, local food is delicious!"
